RESOLUTION: 2019-20 Fiscal Year Budget:

The Resolution to adopt the Fiscal Year 2019-2020 Budget outlines the fact that the operational millage levy for the City of Hudson will remain at 10.6419 mills (\$10.6419 per \$1,000 Taxable Value) to a total levy for the 2019-2020 fiscal year of 10.6419 mills (\$10.6419 per \$1,000 Taxable Value).

It further outlines that 1.0000 additional mill (\$1.00 per \$1,000 Taxable Value) be assessed for Advanced Life Support.

APPROVE: Reappraisal Agreement:

The City has an outstanding State requirement to complete a reappraisal of all parcels of property within the City. This needs to be completed by the end of the year in order to receive the tax roll back from the State and for the Assessor to sign the tax roll for next year.

Renius & Renius has provided us with a proposal to conduct a complete reappraisal and have it completed by the end of the year. Though the timeline is very tight given the effort required, they can complete the

reappraisal in time for a cost of \$55 per parcel for the 874 residential and agricultural parcels, and #30 per parcel for the 161 commercial and industrial parcels, for a total cost of \$52,900.00 Funding is already budgeted for this task in the current budget, and we have included the required remaining funding in the upcoming fiscal year budget.

MINUTES FROM OTHER BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS:

Minutes from DDA dated April 19, 2018:

Motion by Lee Ann Minton, seconded by Lee Daugherty to accept the minutes from DDA dated April 25, 2019 and place on file, CARRIED: 7-0 by roll call vote.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

• DEQ Lead Service Line Grant: The construction work part of the grant has been completed. Approximately 30 lead or galvanized service lines were replaced through this grant. Remaining work

includes water distribution system surveying and compilation for input into the Infrastructure GIS database, and a rate survey. FYI, the DEQ has been renamed EGLE, for Environment, Great Lakes & Energy.

- Wastewater Improvement Project: Ted received and installed the two new oxidation ditch sensor probes, and the shield for the flow transducer located in the UV subsystem. More sidewalks were completed and grading is in progress for the driveway around the plant.
- The excavation work on the 10" sewer line adjacent to the Jackson Street Bridge was completed last week, with only asphalt paving still to be done. This work falls within the wastewater improvement project, but we have not yet determined how much the work cost, or how we will pay for it. At the very least, it will exhaust the remaining project contingency money.
- N Maple Grove: MDOT informed us today that we were not selected for the immediate award (Michigan fiscal year 2019) of the MDOT TEDF Cat B grant for which we applied to help fund the reconstruction of North Maple Grove Avenue. City Manager is under the impression, however, that we will be awarded the grant for fiscal year 2020, starting in October. Official notification for this grant will occur at the end of this month. If we get it, we still cannot conduct any road construction until October 1st. Non-road construction work within the project could begin prior to then (such as the sewer re-lining or new water line work). He is recommending not beginning the project this year, apart from possibly contracting to re-line the sewer. We would re-bid the project just after the start of the year in order to get more bids which should be less expensive, and start project construction next spring. Regardless, we now will wait to the end of the month to find out if we will get the 2020 grant.
- Flooding: we received 3.25" of rain overnight this week, with the most significant flooding in 10 years. With the ground already near saturation, the wastewater plant received a great deal of I&I (Inflow and Infiltration) into the wastewater plant again, although it appears most of this came from east of the Jackson Street lift station and not west, as in the past. Water backed up near Thompson Field and caused high water past McDonald's. Ted had to shut off the ditches and run the flow through the UV system due to the high flow and resistance from the creek due to the high-water levels. Today (Fri.) Ted is getting the plant back to normal.
